Upon the passage of Act 2024-440, the Alabama Department of Revenue (ALDOR) is now required to appoint an additional member to serve on the Jefferson County Board of Equalization (BOE). Section 40-3-2, Code of Alabama 1975, is 11 12 amended to read as follows: 13 "§40-3-2

Enrolled, An Act,

14 (a) This subsection shall apply to every county in the 15 state except a county subject to subsection (b). During the 16 month of August, 1943, and during the month of August of each 17 fourth year thereafter, the county commission of each county, 18 the county board of education, and the governing body of the 19 largest municipality in each county shall each submit in 20 writing to the state Commissioner of Revenue the names of 21 three persons, and the governing body of each other 22 incorporated municipality within the county shall, in like 23 manner, submit the name of one person, all of whom are 24 residents of the county, who are each owners of taxable real 25 property that is located within the county, who are each 26 qualified electors in the county and who are, in the opinion of the nominating body, persons competent to serve as members 27 of the county board of equalization. In those counties where 28

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there is no incorporated municipality, the commission of the 29 . county shall nominate six persons as competent persons for 30 appointment to membership on the board of equalization. From 31 each group of three nominees submitted by the county governing 32 bodies and the county board of education and from the total 33 group of nominees submitted by the governing bodies of the 34 35 municipalities, the Commissioner of Revenue, within 30 days after receipt of the lists of nominees, with the approval of 36 37 the Governor shall appoint one person to membership on the county board of equalization so that the membership of the 38 39 board shall be composed of three members, one of whom was nominated by the governing body of the county, one by the 40 county board of education, and one by the governing body of 41 42. the incorporated municipalities in the county, except, 43 however, that in those counties having no incorporated municipality, two of the three members of the board shall be 44 45 selected from the six nominees of the county governing body; 46 provided, that the Commissioner of Revenue may reject any 47 group of nominees, in which event the body nominating them 48 shall submit additional names, one of whom shall be appointed 49 by the Commissioner of Revenue with the approval of the 50 Governor. The members of the several county boards of 51 equalization appointed from the nominees as in this section 52 provided shall hold office for four years beginning October 1, 53 1943, and every fourth year thereafter. In all counties having 54 a population of 400,000 or more persons according to the 1940 55 federal census or any subsequent census, where there is now or 56 hereafter may be a countywide civil service system, all



nominees must take an examination and qualify by a civil 57 service examination to be conducted by the civil service 58 system, except any member of any board of equalization now 59 duly appointed as a member of the board of equalization shall 60 be deemed qualified for appointment. In the event the names 61 submitted by either the county commission of the county, the 62 county board of education, and the governing body of the 63 largest municipality in the county having a countywide civil 64 65 service system have already been submitted by either of the 66 nominating parties, the Commissioner of Revenue shall so notify the nominating bodies, and the nominating bodies shall 67 forthwith submit the names of another person or persons 68 69 qualified under the civil service examination not theretofore 70 nominated by the other nominating bodies. In the event that 71 any nominating body fails to timely submit a list of nominations for appointments to the county's board of 72 73 equalization, the Commissioner of Revenue may appoint members derived from the remaining nominees previously submitted by 74 75 other nominating bodies.

(b) (1) Notwithstanding any other provisions of this 76 section, this This subsection shall apply to any county of this 77 78 state which has a population of 600,000 or more according to the last or any subsequent federal census. On October 1, 1975, 79 80 the office of chairmanship of the board is created. The chairman shall be the executive officer of the board and shall 81 supervise the assignment of duties to members and employees. 82 The provisions of the Merit System law, including the 83 provisions thereof governing appointment and compensation of 84



persons subject to the Merit System law, shall apply to the 85 chairmanship and to the chairman, until July 1, 2024. 86 Until July 1, 2024, #the governing body of the county 87 shall appoint the chairman subject to the Merit System law. 88 Any person who is serving as chairman on October 1, 1975, and 89 , who has so served for at least 24 consecutive months 90 immediately prior to such date shall be deemed to have been 91 92 appointed under the provisions of this subsection and to have acquired permanent civil cervice status as chairman. 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The county board of education and the governing body of



the largest municipality in the county shall each submit in 113 writing to the state Commissioner of Revenue the names of 114 three persons, and the governing body of each other 115 municipality within the county shall, in like manner, submit 116 the name of one person, all of whom are residents of the 117 county, who are each owners of taxable property which is 118 located within this state, who are qualified electors in the 119 county and who are, in the opinion of the nominating board, 120 persons competent to serve as members of the board. 121

Trail Marker Project Summary:

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My name is Joseph Spencer, and I am a Junior at Mountain Brook High School. I am also a Scout with Troop 53 at Saint Peter's Anglican Church, and I would like to pursue the following for my Eagle Scout project.

My Eagle Project entails placing quarter mile markers throughout various trails in Mountain Brook. Over the past few months I have been coordinating and planning this project with Parks and Rec Superintendent Shanda Williams and prominent city architect Nimrod Long. Together we have walked the trail and have marked exact locations for each post. I have also been working with Carolyn Buck from the Freshwater Land Trust, Graham Smith, and Sally Worthen. The posts will be placed 2-4 feet off the trail in a visible yet unobstructed area. In total, the trail is 4.17 miles long. The Trail goes as follows:

- 1. Mountain Brook Elementary Field
- 2. Watkins Trail
- 3. Jemison Trail
- 4. Beechwood Road
- 5. Old Leeds Road
- 6. Irondale Furnace Trail

These markers will indicate to trail users how far they have traveled. Also, these markers will provide continuity along adjacent trails in Mountain Brook. From a safety standpoint, these markers aid the community as well. Each sign provided by the Freshwater Land Trust will have a QR code which can be scanned by smartphones in the event of an emergency. When scanned, three words will be displayed on the screen of its user. When the user reads these 3 words to the fire department, the exact location of the caller can be pinpointed. This information will improve the response time of emergency personnel.

Design: Working with Nimrod Long, we have determined the following design for the signs. The post will be made of 4"x4" pressure treated ground contact pine. Each post will be 72" in length, including 24" below ground and 48" above ground. The posts will also be stained black and anchored in the ground with concrete. Below is a list of materials, supplies, and tools needed for this project.

Note: I will raise funds from family and my troop to fund this project, including the following materials, supplies, and tools. Also, in the interest of safety we request that the Parks and Rec auger the holes shortly before I and my troop install the signs.

RE:	Conditional Use – Village Pet Grooming 2921 Cahaba Road (existing Village Pet Care - Veterinary)

See attached letter from the applicant regarding the proposed operational characteristics. It appears from the letter that the proposal meets the conditional use ordinance (see below) with respect to outdoor runs, overnight boarding and noise abatement.

There are a handful of unstriped parking spaces on-site (at the rear of the building) which should be sufficient for the employees of the proposed veterinary office. On-street parking along Cahaba Road will be utilized by patrons, and is shared with other retail uses and Brick & Tin. The grooming business will be closed on Saturdays and Sundays, thereby reducing the street parking demand on the weekends from the current parking generated by the veterinary practice on Saturdays.

The zoning ordinance requires council approval of a grooming use as follows:

"Section 129-192. Veterinary clinics/pet grooming, provided that there be no outdoor runs, and that business be conducted wholly within a building; no overnight boarding. Conditional review and approval shall ensure that sufficient areas for loading and unloading animals be provided, that appropriate measures be employed to minimize noise, odors, waste or other negative impacts incidental to operation of the business, and that the proposed use is compatible with the surrounding commercial and residential uses." June 12, 2024

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Village Pet Care 2921Cahaba Road Mountain Brook Village

We would like to open Village Pet Grooming at the 2921 Cahaba Road location, where Village Pet Care is presently located. This would replace the current veterinary practice.

This business would be a grooming-and-bathing-only business with the following:

- Business Hours 7am to 5pm, Monday-Friday (Closed Saturday and Sunday)
- No Boarding or Overnight stay of pets
- All pets will be housed indoors during business hours (No outdoor kenneling)
- 3 to 4 employees during peak hours

- All Employee Parking will be behind the building on private property (No City Street Parking)

- Expected number of clients during a peak hour - 2 to 3

- Estimate of 20 clients using street parking and rear parking throughout the day

Sod is warrantied for a period of 30 days after installation. Stated warranty specifically excludes but is not limited to, watering, damage due to watering practices, insects, disease, or other circumstances beyond our control arising after the installation. Blackjack Horticulture is not responsible for any damage resulting from watering or other restrictions imposed by public works entities or other civil authorities and does not warranty any planting not irrigated by an automatic irrigation system. Blackjack Horticulture is not responsible for and does not warranty plants that have been transplanted, uprooted, or otherwise disturbed/moved from their original location.

C) Blackjack Horticulture is not responsible for any subsurface obstacles or debris (i.e. rock) that may prevent plants, irrigation, masonry work, or any other part of the contract from being implemented as originally intended. Any excavation or removal of such items or any required re-design may result in additional charges to the owner. Blackjack Horticulture is not responsible for damage caused to any underground or hidden items not clearly guarded or marked.

D) The above proposal is a description of the work to be performed. Any item not specifically detailed above should be assumed to not be included unless otherwise stated. From time to time, certain types or variations of materials can become unavailable between the initial pricing of a proposed project and the time of construction/implementation. If a specific type, color, or size of material (i.e. plant types/sizes, masonry material color, stone, paver, etc.) is not available at the time of installation, a viable substitute that is as similar as possible to the original will be recommended to the owner along with any cost impact. Owner or owner's representative will be required to approve the change and any associated cost impact.

E) Blackjack Horticulture is not responsible for design flaws, errors, or omissions in a design provided by another party, nor is Blackjack Horticulture responsible for plant material, or any other material type, that does not survive or is not conducive to its location or use as required in a design or specifications by another party.

F) Final invoice will reflect actual quantities installed where applicable. If unit prices are provided, they are intended to give an approximate value to a specific item and do not always provide an exact price for additions and deletions. If material has been purchased for a project prior to a change being made, customer is obligated to pay for any cost associated with the material, any applicable freight/delivery, plus a 25% handling fee. If material has been installed prior to changes, customer is obligated to pay for the material in full at its original price, plus any costs associated with removing and replacing the material.

G) Customer agrees to pay Blackjack Horticulture a deposit in the amount of 35% of the total dollar amount listed above prior to commencement of work and further agrees to pay the remaining balance upon final completion of the work. Any project with a duration longer than one month may be subject to progress billing at the end of each month based upon completed work to date. All payments are due within the terms set forth on the invoice. Any past due payments are subject to late fees as detailed on the invoice.

H) Blackjack Horticulture reserves the right to engage the services of an attorney or collection agency in order to enforce the terms of this agreement and/or collect any late payments it may be due. Should this become necessary, any and all attorney or collection fees will be added to any previous amount owed Blackjack Horticulture and will be due and payable by the customer.

I) Prices good only if accepted within 30 days. In addition, Blackjack Horticulture cannot begin to schedule a project or include a project in planning and preparation stages until receiving a final, signed proposal and construction deposit.

J) By signing below, the customer represents that they are the responsible party for the agreement and its obligations and are legally able and authorized to enter into this agreement as the owner/customer, or on behalf of the owner. Customer further agrees with the terms and conditions set forth in this document and the description of work to be performed as described above and acknowledges that any other items outside the scope of work described above will be performed at an additional charge that becomes due and payable upon completion.

K) The contract price for this project has been calculated based on the current prices and availability for the materials required. However, the market for some of the materials that are specified herein is considered to be volatile, and sudden price increases could occur. The Contractor agrees to use his best efforts to obtain the lowest possible prices from available suppliers, but in the event of significant delay or an increase in the prices of specified materials beyond the Contractor's control that are purchased after execution of contract for use in this project, the Owner agrees to equitably adjust any specified time of completion and/or contract requirements as may be needed for completion and pay any difference between the originally priced material and any increase in costs to the Contractor. Any claim by the Contractor for payment of a cost increase, as provided above, shall be via written notice delivered by the Contractor to the Owner stating the increased cost, the building material, or materials in question for notice and approval by the Owner before Contractor proceeds further. RE: Home Occupation

The City has received several complaints (spanning over several years) from multiple homeowners regarding a home occupation within Mountain Brook. This home occupation generates significant traffic for the neighborhood. This is due to individuals attending the home occupation, parking along the narrow street, in front of houses, and individuals dropping off and picking up their children. The home occupation has grown significantly over the years and now offers multiple classes a day during the week for both adults and children with some classes having over 15 attendees. The residents of the neighborhood are concerned and upset regarding the traffic that is generated as a result of this home occupation. I would like to discuss amending the home occupation ordinance to further restrict uses concerning personal services in residences. If you are agreeable then we can follow these steps:

1. Discuss amending the home occupation ordinance at the pre-meeting for 06/24/24

2. If the council is in agreement, ask the Planning Commission to consider amending the home occupation ordinance.

3. After receiving the recommendation from the Planning Commission, the council can vote on the amendments to the ordinance (likely in August or September).

4. The amendment, if approved, could be effective January 1, 2025 to give any affected business owner(s) time to secure other venues for their business.
